OVERVIEW

The Lift Academy was launched in 2007 to provide seminars for apprentices and trainees as it was recognised that in general seminar events normally involve senior managers from the industry. As a result training relative to issues such as current standards, products etc are normally learnt in the field rather than in a controlled environment.

The Academy has gone from strength to strength and has been well received by both the apprentices and trainees as well as senior managers from the industry.

Regular meetings have been held in London and Manchester throughout the year and it is pleasing that the events have been supported by companies of all sizes. As a result, and based on an average meeting lasting 1 ½ hours, just under 600 person hours of training have been provided to the apprentices/trainees.

ANNUAL COMPETITION

A competition was launched which was sponsored by the CIBSE Lift Group. The competition is intended to promote the apprentices to write about their work and an article of approximately 1,000 words was requested based on the regular columns in the UK trade journal *ELEVATION*.

The judging was undertaken by an independent panel formed of Dr Gina Barney of Gina Barney Associates, Vince Sharpe of Allianz Cornhill and Nick Mellor of Pickering Lifts.

The winning apprentice was Chris Etchells of ANSA Elevators who received £250 for his article about brakes. The runner up was Jake Ellkin of the Jackson Lift Group who wrote an article about Ward Leonards Systems and was awarded £100.

We were very pleased that 8 entries were received from the apprentices all of whom received a free subscription as Student Members to The Chartered Institution of Building Services Engineers.

Again, our thanks go to the judges for their assistance with the competition which we hope will become an annual event.

THE FUTURE

Active discussions are ongoing with Glasgow City Council who have offered to provide a room for the Academy. The format of the meetings is under discussion and it is hoped to launch in Glasgow during 2009.

It is hoped that a web site can be launched which will provide details of meetings and make available copies of the papers presented.

A shared apprentice scheme is under consideration. It is acknowledged that some companies do not have the resources to employ an apprentice but would wish to assist in training for the general future benefit of the industry. Discussion is ongoing with an enterprise agency as to whether a shared apprentice would be a workable proposition.

It is also hoped to be able to develop a lending library with lift related material that the apprentices could call upon when needed.

Finally, we wish to expand the number of companies sending their apprentices and trainees to the events.

CONCLUSION

I am extremely pleased with the first year of the Academy and all indications are that the initial concept was a good idea and that it provides a worthwhile service to the industry. On that basis it has been decided to continue and to develop the services for the furtherance of the industry and its future.
